

(ii) Sector Contributions to the National Development Plan

Through the 5-year National Development Plan, Government Uganda identified, articulated and prioritised the "strengthening of good governance and human security" as a national development goal and a Through the 5-year National Development Plan, Government Uganda identified, articulated and prioritised the "strengthening of good governance and human security" as a national development goal and a key contributor to national growth, employment and prosperity. Importantly, the National Development Plan recognises the specific elements of upholding peace and national security; dealing with post conflict reconstruction; upholding the rule of law and human rights; strengthening JLOS institutions; institutionalising zero tolerance to corruption and protection of rights and civil liberties as critical to good governance and human security. Effective and accountable Justice, Law and Order institutions, rule of law and the protection and promotion of human rights are not only essential for sustainable peace building, but are underpinning all the NDP development goals (objectives) in general. JLOS represents a prime lever in respect of advancing a society governed by rule of law, the latter being a pre-requisite for development. This is commensurate with the macro economic analysis framework that constituted the basis for identification of the NDP.

The theme of the NDP, "Growth, Employment and Prosperity," captures the strategic priorities of the Justice, Law and Order Sector. Since the development of the first JLOS Strategic Investment Plan in 2001, the Sector has directed its attention largely towards promotion of rule the rule of law; fostering adherence to human rights; promoting access to justice particularly for the poor and the marginalised; increasing personal safety and security of property and contributing to national efforts towards economic development. Much has been achieved then, although institution capacity development is still required to ensure a comprehensive reach to all segments of the Ugandan population. The JLOS reforms have led to improvements in the national legal and regulatory framework, restoration of public confidence in the formal and informal justice systems; increasing levels of private sector investments among others. JLOS is progressively endeavouring to act in a more coordinated manner to support the people of Uganda and the entire Government to discharge its function to serve all people in Uganda; address the national development challenges and ensure its contribution to the NDP goal of "Growth, Employment and Prosperity."

(iii) Medium Term Sector Policy Objectives

The sector objectives which guide medium term outputs and resource allocations are:

i.To promote rule of law and due process;

ii.To foster a human rights culture across the JLOS institutions;

iii. To enhance access to justice for all especially the marginalised and the poor;

iv. To reduce incidence of crime, to promote safety of the person and security of property; and

v.To enhance JLOS contribution to economic development;

(iv) Key Policy Implementation Issues to be addressed over the Medium Term

The sector considers the following issues crucial to address over the medium term, to improve sector performance and the achievement of sector objectives

- High Case Backlog
- Inadequate Access to JLOS Services, especially for the poor and marginalised
- High incidence of crime and enhancing safety of persons and security of property
- Slow Legislative Reforms and inadequate awareness about Human Rights.

S2: Past Sector Performance and Medium Term Plans

This section describes past and future performance, in terms of sector outcomes, key sector outputs, costs and plans to address key sector performance issues.

(i) Sector Outcomes and the Achievement of Sector Objectives

Promote Rule of Law and Due Process.

Sector Summary

JLOS has undertaken law reform and revision of key laws to enhance certainty of laws and predictability of outcomes. A total of 20 laws have been prioritised for reform over the medium term. The sector has made the revised laws widely available by translation into a number of local languages. JLOS has supported the JSC to supervise the Judiciary to enhance independence of the judicial process. JLOS has in this regard trained judicial officers, provided legal reference materials, and developed a sector-wide anti-corruption strategy to address real and perceived corruption in the sector. The key performance issues under this outcome are:

- -Key laws initiated by JLOS that are enacted and enforced by 2010
- -% of investors, private sector and the public confident of enforceability of contracts, judicial decisions and the law by 2010
- -% reduction in index of perceived corruption within JLOS institutions by 2010

Enhance access to justice for all, especially the poor and the marginalized.

The sector has opened regional offices upcountry and border posts in remote corners of Uganda. The sector de-concentration programme is aimed at enhance the physical presence of JLOS institutions in all parts of Uganda preferably under one roof. Regional offices have been opened in Mbarara, Gulu and Arua. JLOS has endeavoured to establish police presence in all sub-counties and to strengthen the police presence in the formerly conflict affected areas in northern Uganda. Similarly the sector had developed the Case Backlog reduction strategy to expedite speedy disposal of cases and matters and to reduce prisons population and congestion. Innovative approaches such as mediation, conciliation, alternative sentencing, strengthening the Local Council Courts and rolling out National Community Service Programme have been undertaken. The key performance issues under this outcome are:

- -% of public with access to JLOS institutions increased from 25% to 50% by 2010
- -Average time spent on remand after committal reduced to under 2 years for capital offences and 6 months for petty offences (after hearing starts), and 3 months for juveniles by 2010
- -Fast track and small claims systems developed and instituted in all courts/procedures by end 2010
- -50% increase in disposal rate for cases and services within set benchmarks for each institution by 2010
- -Increased % of vulnerable groups in need of legal aid who have access to satisfactory and timely legal aid services by 2010
- -30 % increase in use of alternative processes for fair resolution of disputes by 2010
- -60% of local council courts meeting set benchmarks for quality and effectiveness by 2010

Reduce incidence of crime.

The sector has enhances the capacity of the Police Force to respond to crime by recruiting and training police officers, increasing the police to population ratio, and supporting interventions to reduce rates of reoffending through rehabilitation of offenders in prisons and in juvenile remand homes. The police has been provided with patrol vehicles, motor cycles and scene of crime kits to deter and detect crimes. The capacity of the CID, the Government Analytical Laboratory and the DPP to investigate and prosecute crime has been enhanced through specialized training. JLOS has supported the National Focal Point for Small Arms and Light Weapons to stem the proliferation of small arms throughout the country. The Anti-Stock Theft Unit (ASTU) has been established by the Uganda Police in Karamoja to reduce cattle rustling and lawlessness in the region. The key performance issues under this outcome are.

(ii) Past and Future Planned Sector Outputs

Performance for the first half of the 2009/10 financial year

Legislation and Legal services:

By December 2009, 41cases against the Attorney General were concluded and of these, 31 cases were won; saving Shs. 3.155bn. The remaining 10 cases worth Shs. 3.258bn were lost. Twelve (12) Bills, 11 Acts, 25 Statutory Instruments, and 01 Ordinance, 07 Legal Notices were drafted and published; and 15 requests for advice responded to. The Directorate of Legal Advisory Services reviewed and drafted 823 contracts and MoUs and responded to 733; 90 requests for Legal advice provided to Ministries, Parastatals, and other agencies. In addition, the Directorate provided legal guidance on procurement issues both to central government and local governments.

Regulation of the Legal Profession

The Department of Law Council under its Disciplinary Committee concluded 55 cases in 23 sittings and 55 cases. In the same period, 549 chambers /Law firms were inspected and of these, and 26 Legal Aid service providers were also inspected.

Registration Births, Deaths, Marriages & Business

The Uganda Registration Services Bureau registered 5,088 Companies and 2,811 Business names. The department also received 640 trademark applications and 942 trademarks were registered where as 289 certificates were renewed. Furthermore, the Department registered 19597 Births; 1012 Deaths; 360 Marriages; 23 Adoptions; 142 Patents, 6,627Documents; 2,382Debentures; 06 Copy rights and 27Assignments. Through a cumulative process, the structure of URSB was developed and discussed by stake holders. In accordance with the URSB Act, the proposed structure was submitted to the ministry of public service for further study and eventual submission to the MoFPED for approval.

Administration of Estates/Property of the Deceased

The Administrator General attended to approximately 3192 clients; were 2158 clients opened up files, 23 clients received letters of Administration and 1011 clients received certificates of no objection. The Department also inspected 25 Estates and gave out 184 land titles. 60 Estates were wounded up. In addition, 300 family arbitrations and mediations were concluded.

Sector Summary

Policy, Planning and Support Services:

The ministry continued to implement deconcetration of its services to the regional level. In support of this process, the ministry received funding from the Royal Netherlands Embassy to construct the Arua Regional Office. The building was completed and handed over in the first quarter of FY 2009/10 and the formal handover of this asset to the beneficiaries included a 2 day workshop for the key stakeholders, both from the Central and Local Governments of West Nile Region. The output of the workshop promotes good governance as regard public contract management and respect for human rights. By the end of December 05 officers were recruited, 02 officers promoted and 15 trained in both long term and short term courses. Various posts have been advertised and they will be filled in the next financial year. Five State Attorneys were identified and deployed to man the Arua Regional offices.

Citizenship and Immigration Services

Facilitated and regulated exit and entry of persons into and out of the country as well as carrying out surveillance to identify and deport illegal immigrants. Issued Visa, Passes and Permits worth shs.5.3bn. The lead time for acquisition of work permits has reduced tremendously from three month to currently 28 days. Reduced time of clearing travelers from 10 minutes to less than 5 minutes. Improved surveillance and expansion of the PISCES which checks undesirable immigrants.

Peace Building

The Ministry supported the formulation of Small Arms and Light Weapon Policy, collaborated with various stakeholders to reduce the proliferation of small arms and light weapons and create District Peace committees in Karamoja cluster; carried out destruction of 3,335 Small Arms and Light weapons, established District Task Force in Mid - Eastern Uganda. Implemented the Amnesty Law through facilitating sensitization, dialogue between Government and dissidents, demobilization, reconciliation of reporters and communities, resettlement and reintegration of 1500 reporters in communities.

Forensic and General Scientific Services

Provided forensic and general scientific, analytical and testing services to Government and the public. Thirty (30%) of pending cases disposed off. 40% of new cases disposed off. Equipment at Mbale Laboratory installed and commissioned

Community Service

Community Service: Consolidated Community Service Programme in 14 districts of Northern Uganda and monitored and carried our rehabilitation programme for 6350 offenders. Consultative meetings to support amendments of CS Act and Regulations undertaken.

NGO Registration and Monitoring

NGO Registration and Monitoring. Registered, regulated, coordinated and monitored NGOs operating in the country. Registered 327 NGOs, renewed 487 NGOs, and held 22 NGO Board meetings. The structure for the NGO Board Secretariat was approved and recruitment ongoing.

Policy, Planning and Support Services

Policy, Planning and Support Services: Procured and maintained machinery, equipment, furniture and transport facilities; carried out recruitment, training and payment of ministry staff salaries and wages.

Judicial services

The growth of case backlog has further declined to 2.5% for the first half of FY 2009/10. Appeals disposed of in the Supreme Court were 9 Civil Appeals, 13 Criminal Appeals, 1 Constitutional Appeals, 9 Civil Applications. At the Court of Appeal, 38 Civil appeals; 10 Civil Applications; 8 Constitutional Petitions; 1 Constitutional Petition Applications 37 criminal appeals and 1 Criminal Applications were disposed of. At the High Court 494 Civil suits; 342 Commercial suits, 208 Criminal suits; 504 Family Suits and 475 Land

Cases disposed off. Magistrate Courts 1,777 Civil cases; 4,718 criminal cases; 278 Family cases and; 225 Land cases and were disposed off. In addition, 32 inspections were conducted Fifteen Computers were procured for the new Judges and procurement of Laptops for all Judges and Chief Magistrates was in progress, 2 commercial bills enacted into law, 2 bills introduced before parliament, 2 bills submitted to cabinet, Research commenced, Trial procedures completed, 4 meetings attended, 2 workshops held, proof reading in progress, meetings held and index of laws drafted, 1 staff on training, 2 press conferences held, 16 staff recruited, half year rent paid, office requirements procured.

Human Rights

263 of the 633 complaints received were investigated and 19 mediated. 75 circuit tribunal hearings were held. 79 complaints were referred other authorities. In addition, 2 mobile complaints sessions were held. Held several workshops with key stake holders. Made 3 monitoring visits to 5 IDP camps and return areas in the Northern Uganda. Participated in camp phase out of 15 IDP camps. Conducted sensitization in the print and electronic media. Printed 1,000 copies of the Police training manual. Trained 40 members of the Judiciary on HRBA and mainstreaming human rights into administration of justice.

Legal Training

At the Law Development Centre 600 bar students, 320 diploma in law students are undergoing training. 318 students were trained in administrative law course in the first session. 5 volumes of Law Reports have been published, vols. 1 & 2 of HCBs 2007 and 2008 have been published, and other related legal materials for students use. 2 research projects are being undertaken. The Legal Aid Clinic has handled juvenile cases, petty criminals, trained police officers, magistrates, community leaders, fit persons on the diversion program. The clinic has also trained Bar students in CLE and ADR. LDC has continued to carry out the administrative support services.

Public Prosecutions

The Directorate prosecuted 62,516 cases of which 45 were at the Supreme Court, Court of Appeal -103, High Court -1,952, Appeals in High Court - 118, High Court Misc.Applications-623, Revisions in High Court - 7, Committals to High Court - 1,882. Three Mini-Registries setup in Nakawa, Mbale & Mbarara while 3 Mini-Libraries setup in RSA offices. Procured legal reference materials; 130 copies of Anti-corruption Act, 8 copies of High Court Monthly Bulletins and 200 copies of Uganda Constitution 2008 abridged. 6 Mutual Legal Assistance requests, 5 extradition cases, 11 cases of international nature & new crime trends handled and 8 international meetings & conferences attended. Two new field offices opened and operationalised while 2 Resident State Prosecutor offices upgraded to Resident State Attorney Offices. Two nationwide and 47 ad hoc inspections conducted, 2,166 public complaints received & handled.

Police Services

Recruited and started training 2,200 PPCs for Police enhancement in Northern and Karamoja areas. Conducted specialized training for CIID, CFPOs and Middle level managers. Started operationalisation of the Duty Free scheme and SACCO to improve personnel welfare. Managed to police riots and civil disobedience in Kampala and neighbouring districts. Serviced and repaired vehicles, maintained and improved sanitation in various barracks. Disposed off 155 old assets. CAPITAL: continued with the construction of Police Headquarters (CIID wing),staff quarters at PTS Kabalye, Natete Police Station, Payment of contractual obligations on helicopter, boats and vehicles and entered into agreement for the procurement of equipment for public order management.

Prison and Correctional Services

Rehabilitated 2,950 offenders by giving them industrial and agricultural skills and reintegrated them in the communities. Retooling 3 prisons industrial workshops (final stage of procurement) Prisoners and staff welfare. A daily average of 31,250 prisoners looked after in the 222 units across the country. Provision of at least a pair of prisoners' uniform to 3,300 prisoners Administration, planning, policy and support services. To enhance professionalism and management accountability, 300 staff from former LAPs retrained in basic

prison management and 10 senior officers trained in management. Safety and security of prisoners, staff, and the Public was enhanced through renovation and repair of 16 prison buildings. Reduced incidence of specific human rights violations such as torture, inhuman and degrading treatment through establishing and operationalising human rights committees in 50% of prison units.

Recruitment, Discipline,

Three Justices of the Supreme Court recruited; appointed 1 Assistant Registrar, 2 Chief Registrars & 3 Magistrates Grade 1. Also, one Magistrate Grade I and two Magistrates Grade II were confirmed in appointment, 1 appointment for Magistrate grade 2 regularized. Held 9 Disciplinary Committee meetings; conducted 2 trips of opening/collecting complaints from districts. Held 1 strategic planning workshop; carried out 7 trips for impact assessment; 1 field survey and 3 M&E trips. Facilitated 5 Commission meetings; 500 copies of Annual Report printed.

2010/11 Planned Outputs

Legislation and Legal services

The Attorney General will further strengthen his mandate of defending government in civil suits. This will be achieved by working closely with the line institutions and agencies. Secondly, access to legal reference materials will be improved through subscription to online e-law web sites and effective representation of the Government in Courts of Law.

Participation in national, regional and international meetings will be strengthened. More efforts will be put in expeditiously drafting/reviewing contracts, agreements and memoranda of understanding; Secondly, responses to requests for Legal advice and preparation of Cabinet Memoranda from Ministries, Parastatals, public and other agencies will also be delivered faster. Similarly, provision of legal guidance to Contracts Committee of ministries, local government, government agencies.

The First Parliamentary Counsel will continue to perform its core function of drafting principal and subsidiary legislation to give effect to the policies of Government and to vet ordinances and byelaws of district and municipal councils. However, drafting, printing and publishing of electoral laws and Constitutional amendments will be prioritized.

Regulation of the Legal Profession

The Law Council will continue its effort in clearance of case backlog through holding more disciplinary proceedings. Inspection and approval of chambers of advocates; Inspection and approval of law degree programs at Universities; licensing legal aid service providers and monitoring and supervising their activities; Computerization of records management; Conducting public awareness programs, organizing workshops and seminars; and Regulation of pro-bono legal services by advocates.

Sector Summary

Registration Births, Deaths, Marriages & Business

The URSB will continue ensuring compliance and enforcement of the companies Act; these will be achieved through workshops and seminars for public awareness; provision through printing of registration materials; and public sensitizations of users and implementation of the client services charter. Other outputs will include harmonization and domestication of international treaties; implementation of copy right regulations; participation in ARIPO, WTO and WIPO; verification and settlement of claims; revitalization of registration of births and deaths in districts; and developing a national policy and strategic plan on BDR.

Administration of Estates/Property of the Deceased

Administration of estate/property of the deceased: To enhance service delivery in the department of Administrator General, the following will be undertaken computerization of records management, provision of office equipment; enhancing public awareness through IEC materials programs, websites and print media; establishment of user committees and complaint mechanisms. Other outputs targeted are 150 letters of administration, 200 estates to be inspected, 400 land transfers, 1,500 certificates of no objection, and 200 estates wound up.

Policy, Planning and Support Services

Deconcetrating Services: In ensuring improved Service Delivery the Ministry will continue deconcetration of services to its clients countrywide. Construction of offices will take place in Mbale and Karamoja to serve the respective regions. Training of staff: Staff will be provided with training to acquire skills in legal drafting, litigation, commercial law, customer care, counseling, family arbitration and mediation, computer skills and estates planning.

Citizenship and Immigration Services

Continue to facilitate and regulate, movement of people, Increase border surveillance, commence the implementation of the ICT Master plan, automate the registries, build the capacity of staff, carry out public relations, commence construction of the Immigration headquarter and continue securing the borders through gazetting and opening new border points and maintaining existing ones.

Peace Building

National Focal Point will continue to reduce illicit small arms, improve stock pile management, developed firearm guidelines and enlisted citizen participation. Amnesty Commission will continue implementing the Amnesty Law through sensitization, demobilization, resettlement and reintegration and build capacity of reporters in communities of return in all seven Demobilization and Resettlement Team (DRTs) offices.

Forensic and General Scientific Services

Operationalise the Directorate of Government Analytical Laboratory and will improve service delivery through provision of forensic and general scientific services to the government and other stakeholders, continue staff training, acquisition of specialized scientific and analytical equipment and commence implementation of the QMS.

Community Service

The National Community Service Program targets to issue 8000 order, increase supervision & monitoring to ensure effective implementation and management of the programme, rehabilitate offenders, and overall contribute to the reduction of the number of petty offenders imprisoned.

NGO Registration and Monitoring

The NGO Board will continue to register and renew the NGOs, Monitor and regulate their operations, coordinate to ensure harmony among them in conformity with government policies.

Policy, Planning and Support Services

Support policy formulation and reviews, planning and budgeting, timely procurement, proper staff

management and timely financial disbursement and accountability. Ministry intends to set up a Commission of inquiry on human sacrifices.

Judicial services

With the planned recruitment of new officers especially Judicial officers and review of the Structure to accommodate the required staffing position, the output will improve as projected earlier.

Legal Reform

2 bills enacted into law, 5 bills tabled in parliament, 4 bills submitted to Cabinet, Research undertaken to refom 2 laws, Study reports and Principles of draft bills submitted to Ministries, Attend EAC meetings, Revision of the compendium of electoral laws, consolidation of the Land Act Cap 227 and the regulations, preparation of the compendium of tax laws, revision of statutory instruments 2005-2007, type setting, proof reading editing and formatting revised penal code and index of laws of Uganda, publishing, training in Legislative drafting, attach staff to sister commissions outside the country, train staff on short term basis, 4 consensus building workshops held, monthly media publications, quarterly radio programs, fill vacant posts, procure office running items, pay rent, maintain office vehicles and equipment in good running condition, procure office computers, ICT equipment and photocopier.

Human Rights

Investigate 700 complaints; receive 1,480 complaints; conclude 700 complaints; conduct 240 spot messages, produce and disseminate on average 24,500 publications, sensitise 2,000 people, monitor transit sites, promote civil military cooperation, receive civil-military related cases, form peace clubs, visit detention, places, review bills before parliament and assess the level of Govt compliance with international treaties and UHRC recommendations, Promote HRBA to development and incorporate human rights into the NDP.

Legal Training

Train 600 Bar students, 300 diploma in law students, 600 administrative law students. Publish Law Reports and High Court Bulletins. Undertake 2 research projects. Carry out community legal aid services. Carry out administrative support services.

Police Services

Continuation of training the 2,200 PPCs. Investigation of cases and reduction of case backlog. Policing the general elections of 2011. Provision of general goods and services, fuel and lubricants, maintenance of vehicles and equipment. Provision of utility (Electricity, water and telephone). Improvement of the human resources through training. CAPITAL: Continued payment of contractual obligations on helicopter, interceptor boats and vehicles and public order management equipment. Continue with the construction of Police Headquarters (CIID wing) and staff quarters at PTS Kabalye. Implementation of the PPP projects. Contractual obligation on the boats and a Helicopter.

Prison and Correctional Services

Through rehabilitation and reintegration of offenders, the Service plans to reduce recivism rate from 28% to 20%. Procure industrial stock for all the 13 workshops to enhance the imparting of vocational skills to offenders. Plant 3600 acres with maize in both project and non-project farms (food worth shs. 3.5bn expected). This will not only enhance provision of agricultural skills to offenders but also supplementing food for prisoners' budget which has a shortfall of shs.15bn.

3600 prisoners rehabilitated and reintegrated in communities. Counselling and spiritual guidance of offenders. The service plans to reduce incidence of specific Human rights of staff and prisoners categorised by type by 90% through A daily average of 32,000 prisoners looked after (fed- 3 meals per day, medical treatment, clothing etc. Procure uniform for 6,100 prisoners and 1,857 staff. A daily average of 522 prisoners taken to 75 courts spread countrywide.

Construct and equip regional referral health unit at Mbarara and Arua. The service intends to shift provision of administration from custodial to correctional services through cabinet white paper and restructuring of the service. Enhance professionalism and prisons management by training 30 Cadet ASPs for 12 months in addition to recruitment and training of 500 low cadre staff, which will result in the reduction of staff prisoner ratio from 1:5 to 1:4.5

Train 40 officers in National ideology at National leadership training Institute (NALI).

Recruitment, Discipline,

JSC plans to recruit Judicial Officers recruited depending on the submissions made by the Judiciary; 3 job advertisement run and 6 Commission meetings. 4 Quarterly newspapers supplements run; 1 Strategic planning workshop held; 4 Quarterly Commission meetings funded; 4 Quarterly M&E trips conducted; 3 staff facilitated to attend conferences for professional bodies. The plan of Public Awareness & Participation in Administration of Justice is to hold 29 radio talk shows in 7 regional centres; print 3,000 copies of the Citizens ' hand book; undertake 7 trips for assessing impact of the awareness creation campaigns. Disposal of 10 disciplinary cases per month; facilitating 21 disciplinary committee meetings; print 2,500 posters of anti-corruption materials; 7 trips of installing Suggestion Boxes, opening & collecting complaints from districts, monitoring Public Complaints System and inspecting courts.

Medium Term Plans

Promote the Rule of Law and Due Process

Support to comprehensive law reforms see JLOS list of priority laws for reform/revision; publication, law reporting, simplification and dissemination. Capacity development of law reform, justice administration and the legal profession functions. Continuing support to the legislative process.

Support to strengthen judgement enforcement mechanisms

Support to the development and enforcement of justice delivery standards.

Foster a human rights culture across JLOS Institutions

i.increase JLOS institutional capacities to apply the human rights based approach to service programming and delivery

ii.Conduct a baseline to establish types/occurrence of specific human rights violations in institutions; initiate a law against torture (as part of KRA 1);

iii.Implement measures to realise minimum standards in conditions in detention facilities;

iv. Pilot model police stations to promote the rights of victims and accused persons; institutionalise complaints mechanisms and develop systems of strengthening institutional and individual accountability.

v.Establish a framework of cooperation with UHRC and other security agencies to minimise occurrence of human rights violations and to promote public confidence in the sector.

iii.Evaluate rehabilitation programmes, develop and implement a strategy aimed at promoting rehabilitation of offenders (including juveniles) to reduce the levels of recidivism in the country.

iv.Review and strengthen the crime prevention policy, develop and implement strategies aimed at halting the increasing growth in the crime rate by e.g. developing national campaigns against specific crimes such as child-related crimes.

v.Foster partnerships with CSOs, the Private Sector and Local Governments to promote safety and security e.g. on fire fighting

Institutional Strengthening to meet Institutional Mandates. As mentioned above, due to resource constraints the Sector prioritised reforms in the medium term in four areas of commercial, criminal, land and family justice. JLOS already has achieved important progress in some of these areas particularly commercial and

criminal justice and also in addressing many significant structural problems that indirectly affect all areas of justice administration including civil justice; and administrative justice. JLOS prioritisation of institutional capacity development across all JLOS institutions delivers tangible benefits to all areas of justice irrespective of their priority ranking in the Sector. The Sector also recognises the costs of institutional development and operating within a limited resource envelope a number of institutional development priorities- remain outside the Sector scope- and yet are essential for national development. The Sector accords priority to institutional support and development for institutions in the Sector to increasingly meet their obligations as spelt out in their mandates and also support sectoral priorities.

Adequate resources to JLOS institutional operations Institutional Development Planned Interventions

- -Strengthen coordination of institutional resources to the JLOS SIP II priorities and strategies
- -Strengthen capacity of JLOS institutions through support to institutional level planning bases; restructuring and retraining; re-equipping and re-tooling;
- -Lobby for increased resources to institutions to match sector priorities and enable effective discharged of institutional mandates.

Other Emerging Priorities. JLOS SIP II 2006-2011 bears a flexible design aimed at progressively bringing on board emerging sector priorities in a manner that is cognisant of the Sector goals and contribution to national development priorities. The Sector has therefore identified the need for substantial investments in transitional justice mechanisms for the post conflict region; support to Anti-corruption initiatives and the need to create efficiency savings in the Sector as priorities for inclusion and integration in the National Development Plan.

JLOS Presence in the Post Conflict Region. JLOS operates under a policy to ensure at least 30% of its five year SIP II investment in the post conflict areas of Northern Uganda. Transitional justice requirements including the operations of a War Crimes Division of the High Court; enhanced JLOS presence in Northern Uganda and implementation of the JLOS contribution to the Peace, Recovery and Development Plan are priorities under the National Development Plan.

Unit Costs for Key Services

Cost of completing a case at the Judiciary – is based on the number of cases heard per session. Session costs differ according to whether the Judicial Officer is resident or visiting. Costs include vehicle fuel and maintenance, allowance to Judicial Officers, allowances to witnesses. These costs would fall as more judicial officers are appointed and deployed as resident to hear cases within their jurisdictions.

Cost of legal training by LDC – includes salaries and allowances of teaching staff, cost of utilities (water and electricity) and provision of teaching materials to students. The cost is restricted to the extent of appropriation in aid generated. Cost has been scaled down in the form of cost-sharing thus shifting some financial burden on to the students to meet the cost of non-core services like accommodation and feeding

Cost of training CID Officers of the Uganda Police Force – Unit cost very low to keep the overall training within available resources. The Police Force carries out annual recruitment and training of 500 constables for 3 months within the allocated budget. The scope of the training is reduced due to the budget constraint thereby impacting on the quality of the cadets passed out.

Cost of investigating a case by of the Uganda Police Force - consists of vehicle running, fuel, allowances to investigators and summoning witnesses to give evidence.

Cost of producing prisoner in Court – includes vehicle fuel and maintenance, day allowances to warders escorting prisoners and cost of feeding prisoner while in Court. Varies due to changes in fuel prices and

increases in allowances by Ministry of Public Service

Cost of maintaining prisoner – includes clothing and beddings, provision of health services, cleaning and sanitation facilities. Cost also includes salaries and allowances to different cadres of staff involved. Also includes provision of three meals per day using rations procured from the open market. Cost subject to market variations arising from seasonal scarcities and surpluses. Cost subsidised by prison farm production which depends on the level of investment in farm machinery, tools and pesticides.

(iii) Plans to Improve Sector Performance

1. High Case Backlog

A newly formulated case backlog reduction strategy recommends a combination of approaches for faster disposal of cases. First, conducting more court sessions and mini-sessions targeting high prison population hotspots. Secondly, promotion of alternative dispute resolution (ADR) and innovative mechanisms alternative sentencing i.e. National Community Service. Others include strengthening the implementation of the administration of Justice bill and enhancement of District Coordination Committees.

2. Inadequate access to JLOS services

Through prioritized renovation, construction and equipping of offices, the sector will improve physical access and availability of JLOS institutions and services. More JLOS staff will be recruited, trained, deployed and equipped to provide quality services. Access to justice at a lower level will be enhanced through strengthening capacity and role of Local Council Courts. The quality of justice delivery will be

enhanced through development and enforcement of minimum standards of service delivery.

3. Slow Legislative Reforms

The sector will implement strategy of lobbying for enactment of laws, publishment of laws and law reports. Eleven laws have been prioritized for enactment and publishing in the FY 2009/10. Capacity building for judicial officers will be conducted to enhance timely delivery and enforcement of judgements and regulations.

Human rights training workshops will be conducted by the UHRC to increase awareness and practice for the JLOS staff especially security agencies and to promote adoption of the Rights Based Approach. Conditions in facilities of the detention centers will be improved.

4. High incidence of crime

Response to crime will be enhanced by strengthening capacity of crime fighting institutions especially the Police Force; recruitment and equipping of staff; and offender rehabilitation; Other strategies will include review crime prevention policy, strengthening community policing programme, demobilization of excombatants, partnerships with regional and international organisations to fight global crime and partnership with private sector and CSOs. Safety of the person and security of property will be enhanced through definition and implementation of a costed strategy for conflict affected areas; enhanced civilian administration of justice in conflict affect areas; reduction of the proliferation of Small Arms and Light Weapons and input to Land Administration.

(i) The Total Budget over the Medium Term

The sector budget is expected to increase by 12 % from FY2009/10 levels to UGX 418.146 Bn for the FY 2010/11 and is expected to increase by 64% to UGX 611.542 Bn over the medium term. The allocations to Uganda Prisons will see a significant increase in the ceiling over the medium term, growing by 38% by FY2012/13. Of the FY2010/11 projected budget allocations, wage expenditure will account for 34% of expenditure whilst non-wage recurrent and GoU will constitute 40% and 22% of the total respectively.

(ii) The major expenditure allocations in the sector

The major services that account for high expenditure in FY 2010/2011 are Police Services of crime prevention, detection and investigations at 49.7% (UGX 207.985 Bn). This is followed by Prison and Correctional Services (UGX 64.117 Bn) which will account for 15% of the sector share. Judicial services under Judiciary will be allocated (UGX 62.363Bn) which is 14.9% of the total budget. Support to the Justice Law and Order Sector will receive UGX 26.198 Bn which represents a 6% share.

(iii) The major planned changes in resource allocations within the sector

A reduction in donor funding in FY2010/11 will see substantial reallocations under the Ministry of Justice and Constitutional Affairs. Uganda Police however will receive an additional UGX 27.015 for the procurement of specialised equipment. Vote function reallocations from last financial year, in addition to justifications and the impact this will have on performance are indicated in the table below.

S4: Sector Challenges for 2010/11 and the Medium Term

This section sets out key outputs in 2010/11 and the medium term which the sector has been unable to fund in its spending plans.

Inadequate Staffing - The work load in the sector has increased following the growth of reported cases in the judiciary. The Judiciary requires 41 judges at high court to bring the total to 82, 8 more justices for court of appeal in addition to existing 7, and as well 7 more chief magistrates to bring the total to 39. DPP requires an additional 95 state attorneys in addition to 290 that are in post. The physical de-concentration of offices countrywide requires staff to man them. The de-concentration of offices and growing workload in the sector has not been proportionately matched with staffing levels in the JLOS particularly for CID officers and State attorneys and the Inspectorate of Courts. The delay in restructuring of the Administrator General Department means that no more staff can be recruited for the department. The ability of JLOS to handle the existing workload and manage growing levels is dependent on the pace of approval and recruitment of staff which are beyond its control.

Case backlog - Case backlog remains a challenge to the sector at all levels of court. The growing confidence of the public in the justice law and order sector coupled with end of conflict in the country has

demanded the reestablishment of civilian authority. This has resulted into an increase in registered cases and yet capacity in some institutions has not been matched. For example there are only 3 Judges in the commercial court, yet one is also a judge at the EAC. Case Backlog in the courts standards at about 40,000; these cases require 1000 sessions of 40 cases each. Assuming each judge can handle 4 sessions in a year, we require 250 judges to handle this back log in a year. The largest contributor to this is the multiplicity of miscellaneous applications, which in some cases are over 40 on one main suit. This calls for stronger efforts at ADR including mediation and arbitration.

Crime rates - gender based violence and increasing mob justice - There was reported a decline in the offence of defilement by 29% in 2008 however cases of ritual murders particularly of children are a challenge. In 2008 over 25 cases were investigated from 3 the previous year. This is more than 8fold. There is also reported high levels of mob justice with over 360 cases reported in 2008 alone compared to 184 the previous year. Similarly deaths from gender based violence and homicides also increase from 1927 in 2007 to 2753 in 2008. Economic crimes are also on the increase 40% in 2008 alone.

Inadequate recurrent budgets. - The investments under the JLOS reform program and also under the interventions in the Conflict Affected areas of Northern Uganda require corresponding recurrent budgets for the wages of recruited staff and officers as well as for operations. The Monitoring and Evaluation visits conducted by the sector showed that vehicles were grounded due to lack of operational funds while a remand home was not functional because of lack of staff. To have a recurrent budget increased means that the JLOS MTEF must be proportionately lifted. The sector is having dialogue with the MoFPED for possible lifting of the Sector MTEF.

Management information systems - The sector still faces the challenge of data capture, storage, and retrieval, processing and reporting. The scope, depth and content of the various instructional reports is inadequate. The various information systems need automation and or review and there is need to link the various data bases. There is also need to build the capacity of personnel who manage the data and prepare reports. The sector has thus planned to undertake a JLOS wide system study with the aim of building an integrated information system for the sector.

High cost of rent: The sector continues to wallow with high costs of rent particularly for the appellant courts and head quarters of key departments. This consumes over 30% of the sector recurrent budget. As a result the sector is planning to undertake construction of a JLOS house and the criminal court. UGX 37 billion is required to construct a house for the Sector to accommodate the Ministry of Justice, the Ministry of Internal Affairs, the Directorate of Public Prosecution, the Uganda Law Reform Commission, the Uganda Prisons Headquarters and the Judicial Service Commission. Although some progress has been made in the area of securing land, the funds for the construction have not yet been secured. New interventions to operationalise of the Anti-Corruption Court and Transitional Justice mechanisms including the War Crimes Division of the High Court have been prioritised within the sector. These will require significant resources (additional UGX 10 billion) over and above the MTEF ceiling for JLOS SWAP Development Fund. The sector is therefore requesting for increase in the MTEF ceiling for Vote 007: Support to Justice, Law and Order Sector from the current UGX 19.57 billion to UGX. 30 billion to accommodate extra resources that will be made available by our Development Partners to fund the new interventions above.

The sector has put in place JLOS District Coordination Committees (DCC's) in all districts to replace the old Chain Linked Committees (CLC's) under the Criminal Justice reform programme. The number of DCC's is more than the old CLC's following increase in the number of districts and expansion of the scope of JLS reforms. The DCC's will work to integrate the role of all agencies and stakeholders across Criminal, Land, Family and Commercial justice to ensure quicker disposal of cases and matters, enhance respect for human rights, promote dispute resolution and alternative sentencing, sensitise local communities on the rights and on the role of the JLOS agencies in service delivery, and monitor JLOS activities in each district.

Sector Summary

This will require an additional UGX 1 billion over and above the MTEF ceiling for JLOS SWAP Development Fund.

The sector is also committed to make a minimum allocation of 30% of the development budget to enhance JLOS presence in the conflict affected areas of the North. This is in addition to the national interventions under the PRDP and KIDDP. This would thus require an additional UGX9billion not provided for within the MTEF

Accommodation of Prisons and Police staff remains a challenge to the sector. 50% of the staff are not housed. A phased approached for the construction of staff houses has been adopted. Shs.4.8bn is required per annum for this activity.

Integration of Local Administration Police and Prisons to central systems has remained unfunded since FY 2006/07 to date. Shs. 5.6bn is required for operations of Prisons.

Increasingly the sector is providing resources to MoJCA under Civil Litigation to defend Government in courts of law. This has resulted in a significant reduction in the number of cases lost and awards made against Government. However, there is no resource provision given to either MoJCA or under the SWAP Development Fund to defend Government.

Expansion of the scope of reforms from 2 Focus Areas (Criminal and Commercial justice) to 4 Focus Areas including Land and Family justice to address the full breadth of justice delivery. An integrated study of Land and Family justice has been completed and the sector has identified specific areas of interventions within these areas that will enhance access and justice delivery to the poor and the marginalized.

Need to review the operations of the Land Tribunals in a move towards their revitalisation. The Land Tribunals are an important component for the delivery of land justice. However there is need for restructuring, recruitment and increased operational budgets for them to operate effectively. This needs to be considered in the budget allocations.

Family and Children's Courts require additional support to operate effectively. Detention facilities, holding centres and remand homes for juveniles are also under funded.

The increase in reported crime from 50% in 2000 to 57% in 2007, and the growth rate of reported cases in the justice system by approximately 55 in 2007 has not been proportionately matched with the staffing levels in the JLOS. This has been compounded by the greater increase in physical de-concentration of services countrywide that requires staff to man the offices. The human resource in the JLOS institutions such as Judicial Officers, Investigators in the CID, State Attorneys and Prosecutors should be increased for them to ably handle the existing caseload and manage the growing levels.

There has been a high turnover of staff among the State Attorneys from the DPP, MoJCA and the ULRC. This is partly attributed to the poor terms and conditions of service for which the sector has proposed salary enhancement. This has further impacted on the existing inadequate staff levels which in some cases are far below the approved establishment such as the DPP. The terms of conditions of service need to be revised to ensure retention of staff.

Restructuring of the Departments of Administrator General and Law Council as well regional offices Department of Administrator General - Article 247 of the Constitution requires that Administrator General's department be decentralized/de-concentrated and accessible to all persons who may reasonably require those services and that the interests of all beneficiaries are adequately protected. After approximately 5 years of interaction with Ministry of Public Service for its restructuring, our request was recently accepted and a staff establishment of 93 was approved.

Sector Summary

The proposed staff structure and a letter from the Ministry of Public Service to this effect are attached for ease of reference. Besides the Constitutional provision, the department of Administrator General serves largely the most vulnerable and disadvantaged members of our society i.e. the widows, orphans, the minors and people of unsound mind, the majority of whom reside upcountry in the rural areas. In order to enhance access to family justice by such people it is pertinent that the Administrator General's services are deconcentrated to regional centres where they can easily be accessed by the beneficiaries. For this reason, we request for the following funding in order to restructure this department without any further delay:-Employee cost (deficit) shs. 277,451,180; Services (deficit) shs. 85,000,000; Capital Development shs. 210,000,000

Department of Law Council - The department of Law Council which is responsible for the regulation and control of legal practice as well as supervision and control of legal aid provision in the country has also taken 5 years of restructuring process. The council lacks a substantive Secretariat. In place is only an office typist and office attendant. The rest of the staff including the Ag. Secretary Law Council, are borrowed staff drawn from other Directorates of the Ministry. In order to finalise the restructuring process, which will culminate into a staff establishment of 28, we need financial support as; Employee cost (deficit) shs. 144,450,072; Services (deficit) shs. 345,000,000; Capital development shs. 120,194,000

One of the causes of the backlog is understaffing within the Judiciary and this is pointed out in the NDP that while the staffing complement is 295 Judicial officers, the optimum staff load is 500. To this, the NDP calls for replacement of the retired Judges and those on Commissions, and increase of the Grade One Magistrates under the professionalization of the Bench programmes. In conclusion, if the staffing position within the Judiciary is increased through recruitment, the capacity gap will be addressed to counter the delays in case disposal in the justice system.
